EMBODIED SPIRIT

Friday Lecture: 7 pm – 9 pm

A one-sided attitude in Western culture values traits and activities that are considered Masculine: thinking, analysis, action, spirit. During depth therapy or analysis both women and men discover negative attitudes toward devalued Feminine characteristics: intuition, empathy, interiority, matter. Often individuals have been unaware that they hold such negative beliefs, which may be causing conflict, symptoms, distortions of self-concept, lowered self-esteem, and an inability to be fully themselves. The person may become aware of feelings of alienation from or neglect of the body and experience a longing to become more fully embodied.

The absence or devaluation of the Feminine can also be seen to be the cause, or contribute to, psychopathological symptoms in persons or in groups and to be intimately connected to the ethos of exploiting the earth and its resources. We will discuss the ways in which the need for a Feminine aspect to life is made conscious during a therapeutic process including the role of dreams and the technique of active imagination.

IMAGES OF TRANSFORMATION

Saturday Workshop: 9:30 – 3:30

Prior to the Christianization of Europe, the sacred Feminine lived in trees and springs, in the connection between the moon and the life of plants, in healing from plants and animals. Indigenous “pagan” practices animated the local natural environment. The Church, however, condemned these practices as heretical and punished them severely.

Medieval European alchemists used a colorful metaphorical language and obscure images when they wrote about their experiments. The practice of transforming one substance into another became a way of contemplating a process of inner transformation. In time, their philosophy became one that was compensatory to Christianity and valued the sacred Feminine. Alchemical paintings and texts refer to the *spirit in matter* or the *spirit below* (as distinguished from the *spirit above* or *heavenly spirit*.)



Text and images from two illuminated alchemical manuscripts--a medieval *Aurora consurgens* and an early Renaissance *Splendor Solis*-- will be discussed.

An active imagination exercise with time for writing and drawing will provide an opportunity to develop appreciation for active imagination as a therapeutic technique as well as a method for self-development. Though sharing is not required, it will be welcome.

Familiarity with alchemy or Jung’s alchemical writings is not required.

Please wear comfortable clothing and bring supplies for drawing.



Clinicians: *C.G. Jung found that alchemical imagery had much in common with the dream imagery of contemporary patients. He studied alchemical works for their psychological value, especially the way that imagery and process emerge during treatment. This workshop should increase your ability to recognize and work constructively with feminine imagery in the dreams, fantasies, and process of patients. It may also sensitize you to a theme that has been appearing more often for some patients: a wish to rediscover a harmony with the natural world, seeing humans as a part of nature rather than outside or above nature.*

Her interests include alchemy, active imagination, shamanism, Lakota spiritual practices, and the work of Wassily Kandinsky.
